

Social media is a collection of several different software platforms designed for easy communication between friends, groups and the general public.

Twitter, fb, and Pinterest are just a few of online tools we can use for our branch's advocacy, free event advertisements, special announcements and reaching potential followers/members.


Public Policy

The Public Policy committee's voter registration efforts were a bit subdued this year compared to last year. We assisted 6 persons at St. Susan's; most persons there are already registered or not interested. Joint Neighborhood Project, another good resource, has closed. At JCC, we assisted several students with questions and helped 2 with their registration. We did not attend the Farmer's Market due to rainy, chilly weather most Fridays. It seems from past experience that most patrons are already registered....or not interested. How can people not be interested in voting??? It is one of our fundamental rights and privileges!

AAUW collaborated again this year with the League of Women Voters in a Candidate Forum.. It was scheduled for October 24th at the Prendergast Library, from 6:30 to 8:30. Scheduled speakers included the candidates for County Executive - Vince Horrigan and Ron Johnson - and Larry Barmore and Lori Cornell for County Clerk from 6:30 to 7:30. Also, from 7:30 to 8:30 were the Legislature Candidates: District 10 - Sharon Lisciandro and Paul Wendel; District 11 - Robert Whitney and David Wilfong; District 12 - Fred Larson and William Pietro; District 15 - Samuel Ognibene and Lisa Vanstrom; District 16 - Tom Erlandson and Ronald Lemon. We believe this is a very important service to the voters of the Jamestown area and no other organization is offering it.

Jamestown AAUW's life member, Mary Joyce D'Aurizio, is the Mayor of Irondequoit, NY and is running for re-election. Mary Jo was president of our branch 1985-1988 when she was living in this area and took out her life membership through our branch. Thus, she still appears as a member of our branch. We wish her success in the upcoming election!



As many of our members are aware, I am the City of Jamestown Historian. My major focus for many years has been on historical markers - those visible, tangible reminders of our history. This year's marker (2013), the 67th marker, at the suggestion of our AAUW member, Traci Langworthy, honors the Chautauqua County Political Equality Club, which organized October 31, 1888 at Allen's Opera House in Jamestown to promote voting rights for women. The Jamestown club hosted members from clubs throughout Chautauqua County. It was the first county organization in New York State and, by 1891 with over 1,000 members, it was the largest county organization in the entire United States. We can be very proud of these stalwart women - and men - who persisted despite many odds in securing the right to vote we today take for granted. In honor of them - VOTE!!

Women for Women International Affairs

Here is another international organization doing good work for women whose needs go beyond the basics: Women for Women International plays a vital role in helping to heal women in war-torn nations including Afghanistan, Bosnia, Rwanda, Congo, Sudan, and Colombia.

The women are survivors of war and conflict and are helped to move toward economic self-sufficiency with a year-long program of direct aid, rights education, job skills training, and small business development. Women who enroll in the one-year program learn job skills and receive business training so they can earn a living. They come to understand their rights and how to fight for those rights in their homes, their communities and their nations. They learn how to become leaders.

The program addresses the women's immediate and long-term needs, works to improve their status and opportunities and see what can be done to create a more just and peaceful world. This organization rates three out of four stars on Charity Navigator who rates non-profit organizations. You can make a one time donation to this organization in any amount or "sponsor a sister" for \$30 a month. Check them out at womenforwomeninternational.org.

International Book Review:

The Other Side of War: Women's Stories of Survival and Hope

This book presents a collection of letters and first-person narratives by amazing women who survived war's devastation and now must find the strength to rebuild families and communities. The Other Side of War explores six regions where Women for Women International has helped survivors of the world's most tumultuous countries learn new skills, open small businesses and forge bonds with sponsors.

Overviews by the author explain how each nation's history led to violent conflict; then the women tell their stories-of horror, cruelty, and suffering but also of profound inspiration as they work toward renewal and toward the day their fierce determination is rewarded with productivity, prosperity, and lasting joy.
