President's Message

Happy New Year! As 2013 begins, you may be examining your lives, making resolutions, and thinking about how you make a difference in our world. I am reminded of



Sir Winston Churchill who said, "You make a living by what you get, but you make a life by what you give." I believe our Jamestown Branch does make a difference in our community, and it is members like you who make it happen.

Just to remind us, this fall we held a voter registration drive and our annual Candidates' Forum. All of us worked hard to produce a successful What's New Fair. I'm happy to report that we netted \$8500 for our scholarship fund from the Fair and gained seven new members!

We have a challenging few months coming up with many opportunities to make a difference to women and girls in our area. But, we cannot do it without all of you.

In March we need to muster all able-bodied members to put on our 14th annual **Get In the Game**. (See the related article about this fantastic day of sports for girls in grades 4-7.) On March 9th, we will have 100+young girls coming together to try eight different sports while learning teamwork and improving their own self-esteem. Please volunteer--whether it is helping with registration, serving lunch, or being a team leader.

On Friday evening, March 8th, we will celebrate International Women's Day, a holiday observed around the world, with a dinner at the Robert H. Jackson Center in collaboration with Zonta International. Our speaker, Katherine Mang, will tell us about her micro-lending organization, Mothers Clubs of Tanzania and Haiti. We need volunteers to help with the planning of this event.

Tech Savvy, a STEM event founded by Buffalo AAUW Branch, will be held on March 16th in Buffalo. Our member Janet Forbes is spearheading our effort to organize local girls to attend Tech Savvy. She will need help from members.

We have three terrific programs that need your support with your attendance. On January 17th we will have a program on your financial future (see the related article), and on March 19th Superior Court Judge Paula Feroleto will speak about "Breaking into a Man's Field." On February 20, we are organizing a panel discussion on last year's AAUW breakthrough research report, "Crossing the Line: Sexual Harassment in High Schools." We need volunteers to help with this program.

Pay Equity Day is April 9th this year. In 2011, women working full time earned only 77% of what men earned-a ratio that has remained stagnant for 10 years. Pay Equity Day is the day that women typically catch up to men's salaries from the previous year.

Last year we put together a Pay Equity Day rally on Tracy Plaza with Mayor Teresi issuing a proclamation. We need to make plans for this year and are looking for a few good women to work with Public Policy Chair, Dolores Thompson, to organize a meaningful event.

As you can see, there is a lot to do-a lot of opportunities for all of us. Please consider making a difference in our branch. Margaret Mead wrote, "Never doubt that a small group of committed people can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has." Public Policy ____

The NYS AAUW 2013-2015 Biennial Action Priorities will be adopted at the State Convention April 26-28 in Lake Placid. The current Priorities read:

- **1. To support** a strong system of public education in New York State that promotes gender fairness, equity and diversity, AAUW New York State advocates:
 - * Adequate and equitable funding for quality public education for all students
 - * Vigorous enforcement of Title IX
 - * Protection of programs that meet the needs of girls in elementary and secondary education
 - * Opposition to the use of public funds for non-public elementary and secondary education
 - * Responsible funding for all levels of education, including early childhood education
- **2. To achieve** economic self-sufficiency for all women, AAUW New York State advocates:
 - * Fairness in compensation, including pay equity,

- Social Security and other pension benefits for women
- * Equitable access and advancement in employment
- * Vigorous enforcement of employment anti-dis crimination statutes
- * Access to affordable, quality, comprehensive health care; and choice in reproductive health care for all women
- * Programs that provide women with education, training, and support for success in the workforce and improve women's earning potential, including women's entrepreneurship
- * Greater availability of and access to quality, affordable dependent care

I am suggesting that the phrase "special needs students" be included somewhere in one of the statements in #1. I need to respond to Donna Seymour by January 15, 2013. If you have any comments, please contact me asap.

Get in the Game

Attention all AAUW members!! We are in need of member volunteers for our 14th Annual Get in the Game! Our 14th annual Get in the Game event will be held at JCC, Saturday, March 9, 2013 from 8 AM to 4 PM.

What is this? It is our local celebration of National Girls and Women in Sports Day and has been a huge success. Girls in grades 4-7 spend the day at JCC rotating through several different sports sessions. We cannot continue this wonderful event without the support of our members. Please consider donating some of you time to encourage our area's young girls to participate in sports. This year we are working on including kayaking, basketball, rugby, track, gymnastics, Zumba, and others.

Here is a description of the various "jobs" that we need our members help with. We ask for volunteers to assist us with the following duties:

1. Registration: Registering/ checking in participants and handing out T- shirts to each registered attendee (from 8 - 9:15 AM). (Most girls are pre-registered.)

6 volunteers needed

2. Lunch: Helping to serve the delivered pizza etc. (from 11:45 AM - 12:45)

4 or 5 volunteers needed

3. Dismissal: Recording each child's pick up by authorized person (from 3 4 PM.)

6 volunteers needed

4. Group Leader: Taking your group of girls to their designated scheduled sport and making sure your group stays together completing all rotations. The Group Leader can be full day 8am-4pm) or 1/2 day morning (8-12pm) or afternoon (12-4pm) but we need 2 adults Group Leaders per group for both morning and afternoon shifts.

14 volunteers needed.

If you have never participated in Get in the Game, you will NOT be disappointed! You will get so much joy out of introducing these girls to sports they can participate in.

Legal Advocacy Fund Support

The following items may be of interest to you from the *LAF Express* newsletter for December.

- This year the LAF awarded more than \$100,000 in case support and Fund 15 LAF Campus Outreach Grant programs.
- AAUW Board of Directors voted to support the lawsuit "LeBlanc v. Trustees of Indiana University." Ms. LeBlanc is the former director of the Hudson and Holland Scholars Program at the university, which is a scholarship program that serves primarily African American students. The suit claims gender and pay discrimination after allegedly facing resistance when Ms. LeBlanc tried to resolve the pay disparity internally.
- The book Stop Street Harassment: Making Public Places Safe and Welcoming for Women is now available in paperback at Amazon for \$15.00. This book addresses the all too common form of harassment that is generally dismissed as harmless but can make

- women feel unsafe in some public places. LAF Program Manager Holly Kearl published the book and has given many talks to AAUW members at state conventions on the subject.
- The documentary "The Invisible War" about military sexual assault (which features several AAUW supported cases) is available from Netflix and Amazon. This film is number 10 on *TIME*'s top 100 movies of 2012. Our branch could also host a screening of this film by downloading the "program in a box" and show the film for \$150.00.
- AAUW members can receive a special 50% discount on Anita Hill's book "I Still Believe" when ordering from the Feminist Press. Use discount code ISBAH50212.

Thank you everyone for donating at this year's Christmas Party to the LAF and EOF funds. We received \$168.00 for each fund. Your donations are supporting the legal rights of those facing discrimination in the workplace (including the military) and schools.

Educational Opportunities Fund

History of Jamestown Branch's Own Grant #1445

In 1980 we made a monumental commitment to create our own Branch Research & Project Grant.

In 1982 we began to put our money towards what was called (at that time) a "Named Unit" within the Research and Project Endowment area of the Educational Foundation. We needed to have \$25,000 in the fund to establish the Grant.

In 1984 new policies were made within the Educational Foundation. But it wasn't until 1988/89 that our funds were transferred to "Endowment" status. At that time we were given 15 years to reach stipend-producing completion status and learned that the new amount needed was \$35,000.

Although we had given 2004 as the target date, we were able to reach our goal early. There is an award from National in our records congratulating us on the completion of the Grant, dated October 2002.

During the years that our Branch worked to establish Grant #1445, the money often came from What's New Fair Funds and personal donations. More recently, the money we donate towards maintaining the Grant comes from your personal donations-monetary (gifts at Christmas, etc.) and from the EOF Garage Sale.

(By the way, our Grant is now in a part of AAUW FUNDS called Educational Opportunities Fundstherefore, EOF.)

At the discretion of National AAUW, the amount of a grant awarded to an individual or project can vary from \$2000-\$12,000.

From 2004/05-2010/11 our Grant, as a Career Development Grant, was awarded each year to a woman who had a 4-year degree and needed assistance in order to continue her education toward her career goal.

Our 2011/12 Grant was a Community Action Grant that went to "The Rites of Passage Program" for a series of workshops to help girls recognize and develop their potential to excel in math and science and to pursue these fields as a career.

This year the Jamestown Grant #1445 is again a Career Development Grant and has been awarded to

Christine Torres who is currently working toward a master's degree at the Finger Lakes School of Acupuncture and Oriental Medicine at the New York Chiropratic College in Seneca Falls, New York. She is particularly interested in supporting women's mental health and fertility



through acupuncture and Chinese herbal medicine.

Circle of Distinction _

The Sep/Oct issue of *Twigs* briefly mentioned the history of the Circle of Distinction. The Nov/Dec issue named the first 5 women. This issue highlights the 6th-10th women.

Bertha Stoneman with a PhD in Botany traveled to South Africa to teach at the newly established Huguenot College, became its third president, and published a botany book still in print. She founded the South African Association of University Women.

The Chautauqua Women's Political Equality Club, organized in Jamestown at Allen's Opera House, was the largest in the US. One member, **Edith Ainge**, active

in Washington D.C., was arrested 5 times for demonstrating and refused to eat prison food.

A group of philanthropic Christian women founded the Women's Christian Association Hospital in 1887, locating it in a once private family home.

Jamestown's Pioneer Women, including **Phoebe Blowers** and **Agnes "Aunt Nancy" Prendergast**, created homes in the early 1800s wilderness, which became Jamestown.

Dr. Jane Lincoln Greely was Jamestown's first woman doctor in the late 1800s, delivering babies at homes and tending to reluctant males. She reportedly drove one of the first electric cars in Jamestown.

I have also served as a Justice for the Town of Chautauqua.

I live in Mayville with my husband, Charlie, and our two dogs (both adopted from the Humane Society, of course) in what was my family's summer cottage; even though it's a little shoebox, we think it's a slice of heaven on the lake. We enjoy traveling when we can, boating when we can, and cooking all the time.

I admire the AAUW's long history of promoting real equality and independence for women through education, hard work, and self-determination. Education in particular is crucial to giving young women the confidence and tools to fight all discrimination and hatred, not just gender based. I look forward to doing what I can to help support the organization and to gain new friendships.
