Public Policy -

A fundamental right of most of the citizens of the modern-day world is the right to choose the leaders of their communities - from the smallest village to the top level of government of their country. It is a right of relatively recent times . . . and one that has been fought for rather than having been granted by a benevolent leadership in power.

Late 18th century men living in the English colonies of North America along the Atlantic Ocean believed they should be able to govern themselves and not be subjects of a king on the other side of that ocean. A little over a half century later, the women of the now free country believed they should have a voice in the government to which they paid taxes and whose laws they were expected to obey. Acquiring that voice proved to be a lengthy and arduous endeavor.

Today, nearly a century later, women not only vote in equal numbers with men, they have begun to seek the offices for which they vote, though not yet in equal numbers. And one day, the United States will

join the enlightened nations of the world with a woman as head of state.

In the meantime, we do our best to encourage everyone to vote and to inform them about the issues currently in the forefront. Jamestown AAUW offered voter registration opportunities at St. Susan's Center, the Eastside YMCA, and at the Prendergast Library.

We again joined with the League of Women Voters to offer a Candidate Forum, which attracted

40-50 attendees. Each candidate for New York State Assembly, Chautauqua County Legislature District 12, Chautauqua County Sheriff, and Family Court Judge presented a brief statement and then answered questions posed by the Forum organizers as well as from the audience. Seeing the candidates and hearing them speak offers a different perspective from the printed word. I have more than once reached a decision or changed my mind after that more personal experience.

The Circle of Distinction

The Circle of Distinction was established in 1982 to recognize the women of our community who were pioneers in one way or another. In the ensuing 25 years, we celebrated the lives of the women of our community who had made a difference in the lives of local women and also those local women who had contributed to the advancement of women's rights in our nation's history. Only two women were recognized while they were still living - they were too important to not be honored during their lifetimes.

In 1988 the Circle honored Edith Ainge and the Political Equality Club. The women's right to vote movement began in 1848 in Seneca Falls, NY. It quickly gained the support of many women and a significant number of men. Political equality clubs sprang up across the country, but not until 1887 in

Jamestown. Clubs soon formed elsewhere in Chautauqua County and, in 1888, representatives of all of them met in Jamestown at Allen's Opera House (now Little Theatre). They joined together as the Chautauqua County Political Equality Club. It was the first county-wide group in New York State and for several years the largest club in the entire nation.

Jamestown resident Edith Ainge was active in Washington D.C. where she served as treasurer of the National Organization and at times held forth at the national headquarters. She picketed the White House, marched in numerous parades, and served time in jail for defying city ordinances.

The City of Jamestown recognized the Equality Club with an historical marker in 2013. It is placed in the small park next to the Little Theatre building.

AAUW has special consultative status at the United Nations

What does that mean? As a nongovernmental organization (NGO), AAUW has special consultative status with the U.N. Department of Economic and Social Affairs. AAUW's board-appointed main representative, Melissa Guardaro of AAUW NYS and our two youth representatives attend briefings, organize events, and form coalitions to take action on women's issues like girls' empowerment, human trafficking, and women's opportunities in science, tech-

nology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM).

Additionally, every year in March AAUW's representatives, staff, and members participate in the Commission on the Status of Women - the international body exclusively dedicated to promoting gender equality and empowering women.

District 1 Meeting
