Legal Advocacy Fund

The U. S. Supreme Court recently upheld the constitutional right for all women to make decisions about their health, family, and future without needless barriers, in the case *Whole Woman's Health v. Hellerstedt*. AAUW believes this case is about more than reproductive health. It is about upholding women's dignity and autonomy. (Baker, para 1-2, AAUW.org).

In an earlier case, in May, 2016, the U. S. Supreme Court opted not to answer important legal questions,

in *Zubik v. Burwell*, a critical case dealing with women's access to birth control. The Court opted to send this case and several related ones back to the lower courts. AAUW is disappointed that women who work for religious nonprofits will continue to lack clarity on their access to contraception. AAUW hopes the lower courts will rule, as many already have, in favor of access to contraception as guaranteed by law. (Maatz, para 1, AAUW.org).

Circle of Distinction

In 1988 the CIRCLE OF DISTINCTION honored Edith Ainge and the Political Equality Club. Edith and the members of the PEC (a number of whom were male) were in the forefront of the suffrage movement in Jamestown and Chautauqua County from the mid-late 1800s to 1920 when women were granted the right to vote in all elections throughout the United States.

The suffrage movement in the US had its beginnings in 1848 at a meeting in Seneca Falls, NY. The men and women attendees decided to focus their efforts for women's equality on women's right to vote. Their efforts were met with contempt and ridicule by the general public and few political leaders took their efforts seriously.

Chautauqua County was slow to adopt serious efforts even though state and national officials often appeared and spoke in Jamestown and Fredonia. Finally, in 1887, the Political Equality Club was organized in Jamestown with 13 members. Other clubs soon formed throughout Chautauqua County. In 1888 representatives from all these clubs met at Allen's Opera House (now Little Theatre) in Jamestown to form a county organization. Speakers at

the meeting included Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony. The Chautauqua County Political Equality Club was the first county organization in New York State. In 1890 there were 1400 members and it was the largest group in the entire nation for several years.

Jamestown resident, Edith Ainge, became active at the national level in Washington, DC, serving as national treasurer. She helped plan many WNY demonstrations, and volunteered for picket duty, gave speeches, marched in parades, and took on whatever else was needed. She was arrested at one point and sent to the old District of Columbia jail where she refused to eat the food of a government that recognized its women citizens only as criminals.

Congress passed the 19th Amendment June 4, 1919, granting US women the right to vote in all elections throughout the US. Following ratification by the requisite number of states, it was signed into law August 26, 1920. And, for the first time in United States history, women had the right to vote that year for the president of the country of which they were citizens.

2. Lunch: Helping to serve the delivered pizza etc. (from 11:45 AM - 12:45) 4 or 5 volunteers needed

3. Dismissal: Recording each child's pick up by authorized person (from 3 4 PM.) 6 volunteers needed



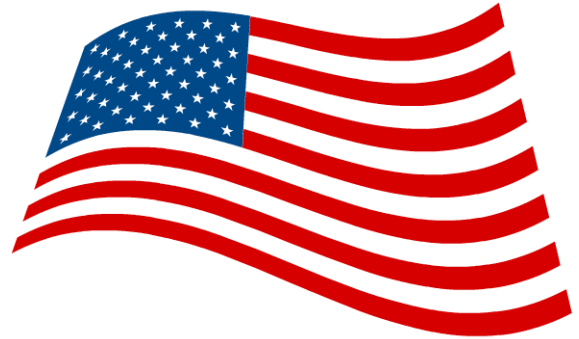
