Do You Know About the New York State Grant Programs? -

Did you know? AAUW-NYS now offers not one, but two exciting grant programs! Created in the 2014-15 fiscal year, the purpose of the NYS grants are to help branches plan mission-based local and district conference programs by providing funds for space, speakers (food, travel, honorariums), and promotion of the events. The aim is that these programs will not only inspire our current members, but attract like-minded new branch members who will be excited by the mission of AAUW. You can find the grant applications on the NYS Treasury page on its website HERE-orhttp://w w.aauw-nys.org/treasury.htm. All applications are reviewed on a rolling basis by AAUW-NYS's Finance Committee.

Branch Grant Program

AAUW-NYS has allocated up to \$500 per branch to support ongoing and new mission-based programming. Applications should include a detailed budget, outline of the program, an explanation of how the program relates to AAUW's mission and vision, and a description of how the program will increase AAUW's visibility (by collaborating with community organizations, providing membership opportunities, etc.).

District Conference Grant Program

AAUW-NYS has also allocated up to \$500 per district for the use of the host branch for district conferences. Grants will support a mission-based focus for a district conference. Similar to the branch grant program, host branches must submit an application with a detailed budget, outline of the program, an explanation of how the program relates to AAUW's mission and vision, a *He Named Me Malala* is scheduled on our usual monthly BOD meeting date.

Janet Forbes, Program VP, will serve as chair of this BOD meeting. A draft agenda will be sent out the week of March 7th. All members are welcome and encouraged to attend the BOD meetings. A decision will be made to name our Branch delegates to the AAUW NYS Convention, discussion of initial Nominating Committee report, etc.

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Public Policy

Unless you have been living in a cave in a remote foreign country, you know this is a Presidential election year. So far, it has been far from dull and it promises to remain equally lively in the months ahead.

This past Fall's election brought to our attention the lack of interest in voting on the part of the generation under 35 years of age. Their grandparents voted at a much higher rate. The rates for both were on the low side, probably because it was a local only election year. One would hope a Presidential election will stir much greater interest on the part of all eligible voters. (I did not ask any of my 12 grandchildren if they voted...)

Circle of Distinction -

In 1987 the Circle welcomed Bertha Stoneman, a member of that remarkable Lakewood family. Her aunt, Kate Stoneman, was the Circle's first honoree.

Bertha was born in Lakewood August 18, 1866. She graduated from Jamestown High School in 1885 and 9 years later earned a bachelor of pedagogy degree from Cornell University, followed by a doctor of science in botany two years later. In 1897 she joined the staff of Huguenot College in Wellington, South Africa, a newly founded college for women.

Bertha was put in charge of the botany department and, by 1905 she had established a large and wellstocked herbarium and botany laboratory. Her book, *Plants and Their Ways in South Africa* was published in 1906, the first one on the subject. She taught other subjects as well and headed the Department of Philosophy.

In 1921 Dr. Stoneman was appointed the third president of the college, a post she held until she retired 12 years later. She was instrumental in founding the South African Association of University Women and served on several significant Boards. She was keenly interested in sports, had tremendous rapport with her students (some became life-long friends), had a talent for composing verse and had a great love of fun and laughter.

Dr. Stoneman died April 30, 1943. Her ashes remained in South Africa until the close of World War II when they were returned to Bentley Cemetery in Lakewood. A woman of remarkable stature who achieved acclaim and renown in another part of the world, she epitomizes the goals which AAUW holds for all women. Intelligent and educated, she used her talents to further human knowledge and progress and, in the process, became greatly beloved and revered.

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What Do Your Annual Dues Support?-

AAUW national is the national voice for AAUW, promoting the mission, vision and goals of AAUW on a national level, and providing support to members and branches through leadership, grant and scholarship programs and funding. AAUW-NYS provides support to its local branches to promote AAUW, raise visibility, provide community leadership, and attract new members dedicated to the mission of AAUW. At the local level, members live the mission of AAUW and are the lifeblood of the organization - giving local scholarships, collaborating with like-minded organizations to address critical community needs, and providing leadership in their local communities on issues of importance to AAUW. Your annual dues support:

1. The promotion of AAUW's overall mission, vision and goals by the national office on a national level:

- Mission: AAUW advances equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research.
- Value Promise: By joining AAUW, you belong to a community that breaks through educational and economic barriers so that all women and girls have a fair chance.
- Vision Statement: AAUW empowers all women and girls to reach their highest potential.
- Diversity Statement: AAUW values and seeks a diverse membership. There shall be no barriers to full participation in this organization on the basis of gender, race, creed, age, sexual orientation, national origin, disability, or class.

2. The lobbying, public policy and research work of the national office, including in 2015-16:

- Fighting for women's rights recent work includes addressing sexual assault on campus;
- Promoting STEM careers for young girls and women;

- Advocating for Pay Equity;
- Producing the report Solving the Equation: The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing, which takes a closer look at the STEM fields where the jobs are but women aren't;
- Lobbying for Reauthorization of the Elementary & Secondary Education Act (ESEA);
- Producing a New Toolkit for Title IX Coordinators;
- Lobbying for the STEM Opportunities Act of 2015 (H.R.467); and
- Continued advocacy on issues such as the Gender Wage Gap, Work-Life Balance, and Economic Justice (i.e., the Paycheck Fairness Act, increasing the Minimum Wage, Paid Family Leave and Paid Sick Days, Health Care and Reproductive Health, and Decreasing Student Loan Debt).

3. The grant programs and legal advocacy and workshop projects of the national office, including:

- The Legal Advocacy Fund;
- Elect Her-Campus Women Win;
- \$tart \$mart Salary Negotiation Workshop;
- Campus leadership Programs; and
- Tech Trek, Elect Her, Tech Savvy.

4. The grants and programming provided for you by the state, including:

- AAUW-NYS Branch Grant Program;
- AAUW-NYS District Conference Grant Program;
- Annual summer leadership conference;
- Focus newsletter; and
- The Business Meeting at the annual convention.

5. Last but not least, your dues support the scholarships and programming of your local branch!

The combination of national, state and local work is what makes being a member of AAUW so powerful and special - we are truly the change makers of our communities and our nation!
